


SCHEV High School Senior Survey Preliminary Results

Brief Summary of How We Got Here

- The ODU Research team submitted a proposal to conduct a web-based survey of high school seniors in Virginia. We engaged in a collaborative effort with SCHEV to develop a survey instrument to identify factors influencing high school seniors' decisions about whether to pursue a post-secondary degree.
- The survey investigated decision-making processes regarding the choice to attend or not attend
 postsecondary education programs, specifically identifying the factors that influence students
 who choose not to pursue higher education.
- The survey content was informed, in part, by insights from the "What We Know About College Decision Making" brief created by SCHEV (which includes data from HCM-Edge Research -"Edge study").
- Up to 600 completed surveys were to be obtained with the note that SCHEV would deem a minimum of 400 to be a reasonable response. Survey efforts and sampling continued until the desired target number was reached and data analysis needed to begin for this July presentation.





Survey Methodology / Other Notes

- Sampling frame list from College Bound Selection Services (CBSS)
 - Allowed for direct mail (postcard) and email (survey invitation/reminders) of VA high school seniors (18 yrs+ to not require parental consent)
 - n=16,253 students
- Postcard followed by email invitation and up to three reminder emails
- \$10 gift card incentive for completion
- Pilot May 9-16 (n=350) / full implementation May 22-24 (n=15,903)
 - Inclusion of open-ended question about "closest friend who is not going to college"
 - Survey completers: Refer a friend who is not planning to go to college (June 6-14)
- N=631 completed surveys
- N=62 who do not plan to attend college




All Survey Respondents: Gender & Race Distribution








Plans for the 12 months After High School

Please indicate how you will continue your education




- 71.2% plan to take classes at a college, university or school located in Virginia / 27.7% plan to go out of state
- 95.6% plan to continue their education with the next 6 months




Non-College Bound Students: Reasons for Not Attending

When asked where getting MOST of their information about **COLLEGE**, parents and school counselors were among the top responses for both groups.

Non-college bound students were more likely to select teachers/coaches while college-bound were more likely to select college websites, campus visits and internet searches.

Open-Ended Questions

- Please tell us anything else that influenced your decision about what you plan to do after high school. You can also use this space to share any other thoughts you have about issues discussed in this survey. (Q10)
 - Approximately 300 responses
- Not everyone plans to attend college after high school. Thinking about your closest friend who does not plan to go to college, why did they decide to not go to college at this time? (Q10b)
 - Approximately 319 responses

<u>(i)</u>

- Results for Virginia resemble those from national/other studies.
- Most frequent reasons for not going to college include costs, {lack of} perceived value/return on investment, {lack of} perceived necessity/utility of a college degree, and not enjoying school.
- Sources of information and messaging may be different for college-bound vs. non-college bound students.

Other considerations:

- About 2/3 of non-college bound students indicate that they may eventually go to college.
- Almost one in four of ALL students are only meeting with school counselors/other school personnel once (or not at all) to discuss plans after high school.
- Very few "unexpected" differences noted between males and females.
